AASHE 2013 SUSTAINABILITY PRACTICES

WASTE ELIMINATION

Through our LEED Silver-certified Music City Center location, we are able to:

- eliminate waste with recycling bins provided by Max-R
- eliminate the use of plastic/disposable water bottles with Water Refill Stations provided by FloWater
- use compostable food utensils
- locally source as much food as possible
- compost food waste
- use tree-free paper for onsite printing needs
- feature EPEAT Gold Standard computers in all concurrent conference session, registration and computer station areas
- control room temperatures and energy output from light sources

Other waste elimination efforts include:

- volunteer shirts made from recycled bottles by Renewtra
- Guidebook, a mobile conference schedule that helps us move away from needing a printed conference program in coming years
- pledges from past attendees to bring their own coffee mug, water container, pens and paper, and re-sourced event lanyard to this year's conference

SUSTAINABILITY *at the* MUSIC CITY CENTER

Just opened in May 2013, the Music City Center is certified Silver with LEED – Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design – by the U.S. Green Building Council.

The building is a 2.1 million square feet, featuring a 353,143 square foot exhibit hall, a 57,500 grand ballroom and 18,000 square foot junior ballroom, and about 1,800 parking spaces. It also offers 90,000 square feet of meeting room space – approximately 60 meeting rooms - and 32 loading docks that provide ultimate flexibility and ease of loading in and out for convention planners.

The Music City Center makes it part of our mission to focus is on environmental sustainability.

GREEN ROOF (HEAT ISLAND REDUCTION)

One of the Music City Center's most impressive sustainable features is the green roof. Designed to mimic the rolling hills of Tennessee, the roof spans over four acres and is currently the largest green roof in the Southeast. The 175,000 square foot roof is composed of 14 different types of vegetation and a waterproofing membrane. The green roof is an integral part in our overall sustainability plan, helping to reduce energy usage by absorbing heat and acting as an insulator to reduce the amount of energy needed to provide heating and cooling to the facility. The waterproofing membrane extends the life of the roof by protecting it from UV rays and wind and by absorbing rainwater, thus reducing the amount of storm water runoff. The green roof helps to lower urban air temperatures by reducing the "heat island effect" and also helps reduce air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. The vegetation on the roof provides a natural habitat for plants, insects and wildlife that would otherwise have limited space in an urban environment.

WATER CONSERVATION

The Music City Center has implemented a successful comprehensive water management plan. All toilets, urinals and faucets in the MCC utilize low flow technology and are equipped with sensor technology to reduce overall water usage. Storm water runoff and condensate from HVAC equipment is collected in a 360,000 gallon rain water cistern, which provides water to over 500 toilets/urinals and irrigates outdoor landscaping. The MCC also uses water-efficient landscape materials that are climate appropriate and native to our region in order to reduce the amount of water needed for irrigation. Our comprehensive water management plan has the capability to reduce our facility's overall water usage by 40%.

RESPONSIBLE PURCHASING

The MCC purchasing department works with our Sustainability Coordinator to identify and purchase the best environmentally friendly products and supplies for the facility. We purchase renewable resources such as bio-based solvents from citrus, seed, vegetable and pine oils, cleaners in concentrates, and reusable/recycled containers.

GREEN OPERATIONS

The Music City Center plans to reduce the facilities environmental footprint by increasing and promoting recycling, buying of green office supplies, utilizing green printing/copying procedures, and assisting customers in hosting green meetings. Our "Green Team" comprised of MCC staff members, contractors, and IATSE Local 46 members to initiate new sustainability practices, educate fellow team members, and ensure current procedures are followed. In an effort to increase awareness and ensure participation, we require every contracted vendor to meet our sustainability standards and all potential vendors must complete a sustainability survey which allows MCC to assess their commitment to the environment.

GREEN CONSTRUCTION/ BUILDING MATERIALS

Designed by Atlanta-based TVS Design, Nashville-based Tuck Hinton Architects, and Moody-Nolan Architects, the 2.1 million square foot Music City Center was designed and constructed with sustainability in mind. Our facility is certified Silver Level LEED – Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design – by the U.S. Green Building Council. The MCC received two LEED points for "Innovation in Design" for having 100% of the parking undercover and a

40% water reduction plan. Our high performance building envelope is equipped with a four-acre green roof, a 200-kilowatt solar panel system and energy efficient technology. The Music City Center's construction theme was "reduce, reuse, recycle," earning us a Brownfield Redevelopment credit for reusing an already-developed location which prevented additional loss of open space in our city. Our goal was to make construction as low-impact as possible by diverting at least 50% of our waste stream during construction to recyclables and by using local building suppliers and 90% recycled glass within our facility. Our state of the art high-performance HVAC systems uses the Nashville District Energy System steam and chilled water which significantly reduces the amount of refrigerant used in the facility and also decreases our overall energy consumption.

QR CODES are located on signs throughout our building to mark our sustainability initiatives.

ENERGY CONSERVATION

Optimization of energy systems were attained by utilization of enhanced energy modeling established during the design and construction phase. High-Performance HVAC systems have been utilized throughout the facility. Variably frequency drives are used throughout the facility to enhance motor, fan and pump performance. Proper performance and energy-operation of HVAC systems is insured by the MCC established Operations and Maintenance Program (O&M). Building lighting systems are controlled by our state-of-the-art automated lighting control program. Occupancy sensors are utilized throughout the facility to reduce overall consumption of electricity, and both HVAC and lighting systems are maximized by utilizing scheduling programs to improve efficiency. An array of 845 solar panels aligns our roof producing renewable energy to assist in powering our HVAC fans throughout the building.

INDOOR AIR QUALITY

The MCC implemented an indoor air quality control plan and used only low emitting VOC materials (adhesives, sealants, paints, coatings, carpet, composite wood and agrifiber products) during the construction process. The MCC will continue to use green cleaning chemicals to maintain good indoor air quality, specifically chemicals that have a low volatile organic compound content. MCC avoids the use of any and all corrosive and strongly irritating substances. The high-performance HVAC systems and high efficiency air filters help to reduce allergens and dust thus improving overall air quality.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

RAJ PATEL | OPENING KEYNOTE

Sunday, October 6



Controversial author, journalist, and food policy expert **Raj Patel** continuously challenges our presumptions about the global economy with his work both as a policy analyst and activist. He has worked for some of the most prestigious international organizations—and protested against them—and constantly works to find ways to improve the world’s food system.

After working for the World Bank, interning at the World Trade Organization, and consulting for the United Nations, Patel has become a harsh critic of their methods and has been tear-gassed on four continents protesting against them. Patel’s thoughts on food, hunger, and globalization have appeared in a number of US and international news sources, including The Los Angeles Times, NYTimes.com, and The Guardian. He has been featured in Newsweek and Time and

has appeared on The Colbert Report, the BBC, and NPR, as well as a range of recent food and economic documentaries (Payback, Queen of the Sun, Finding North).

His most recent book, *The Value of Nothing: How to Reshape Market Society and Redefine Democracy*, has been hailed as a deeply thought-provoking guide to the way economics work, exploring the recent economic collapse and painting a clear picture of how to achieve a fairer, more sustainable economy and society.

In his keynotes, the author of the acclaimed book *Stuffed and Starved: The Hidden Battle for the World Food System* not only diagnoses the causes behind our worldwide food crisis but offers sustainable and feasible solutions to deal with it. An engaging speaker, Raj Patel rouses his audience through his highly pertinent discussions of globalization and the world’s food system. The London native graduated from Balliol College at Oxford University and, by way of the London School of Economics, went on to pursue his PhD from Cornell University, which led him to research economic and cultural globalization.

Patel is an advisor to the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food, and has testified to Congress on the causes of the world food crisis. He is involved in several international organizations, including the Land Research Action Network (LRAN), a network of researchers and social movements committed to the promotion and advancement of the fundamental rights of individuals and communities to land. He also works with La Via Campesina, an international peasant movement advancing the cause of food sovereignty around the world, and with the South African shackdwellers organization, Abahlali base Mjondolo, the largest independent group advocating social change in South Africa.

The co-author of both *Promised Land: Competing Visions of Agrarian Reform and Food Rebellions: Crisis and the Hunger for Justice*, Raj Patel has also published a range of academic articles appearing in publications as varied as PLoS Medicine, the Journal of Peasant Studies, and Radical Philosophy. His work has been translated into dozens of languages.

He is working on a major documentary film project on how to feed the world in the future with acclaimed director Steve James (*Hoop Dreams*, *The Interrupters*) and Participant Media (*An Inconvenient Truth*; *Food, Inc.*).

Patel is currently a visiting scholar in the Center for African Studies at the University of California at Berkeley and an honorary research fellow at the School of Development Studies at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. He is also the recipient of an IATP Food and Community Fellowship and is a fellow at the Institute for Food and Development Policy, also known as Food First.

Phaedra Ellis-Lamkins is the Chief Executive Officer of Green For All. Under her leadership, Green For All has become one of the country's leading advocates for a clean-energy economy, and one of its most important voices on the intersection of economics and environment.

Phaedra has led Green For All to several groundbreaking policy victories at the federal, state, and local levels. At the federal level, she led a successful effort to include two key provisions in the House's climate and energy bill: securing funding for job training and guaranteeing broad access to clean-energy jobs.

Under Phaedra, Green For All has helped states like Washington and New Mexico pioneer state-level green jobs and energy-efficiency programs. And the organization is helping cities like Portland and Seattle craft groundbreaking energy-efficiency home upgrade programs that use innovative financing mechanisms and community agreements about job standards to cut energy bills, create green jobs, reduce pollution, and expand business opportunities.

Green For All is redefining the face of environmentalism. Through partnerships with popular artists such as The Black Eyed Peas, Drake, Wiz Khalifa and Wyclef Jean, Green For All is reaching new audiences about the benefits and opportunities of going green.

Prior to joining Green For All, Phaedra was a leader in California's labor movement, heading both the South Bay AFL-CIO Labor Council and Working Partnerships USA. This has given her a unique perspective that has enabled her to bring labor, environmental, business, grassroots, and government leaders together in common purpose. Her ability to speak to all of these groups has made Phaedra one of America's preeminent leaders on green jobs and green pathways out of poverty.

The scope and scale of Phaedra's many achievements have won her wide praise and recognition. In 2011, The Grio recognized Phaedra as one of their 100 History Makers In The Making. In 2010, for the second year in a row, Ebony included her in its Power 150 and Essence named Phaedra one of the 25 Most Influential African-Americans in 2009 and one of the 21 Leaders of the New School in 2010. Black Enterprise Magazine honored Phaedra as one of their 2010, 40 Next: Emerging Leaders for Our Future. She has been featured in various outlets, including the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, the San Francisco Chronicle, and The Huffington Post, and on ABC, BET, CNN, MSNBC, and NBC.

Phaedra leads on numerous boards including serving as the Chair of the Department of Labor's Advisory Committee on Apprenticeship, the Commission to Engage African Americans on Climate Change for the Joint Center, the Economic Policy Institute, the Leadership Council of California Forward, the Tipping Point Community Board, and the Partnership for Working Families. Phaedra serves as a Young Global Leader with the World Economic Forum.

Investing in Energy Efficiency through Green Revolving Funds

PANELISTS:

MARK ORLOWSKI, Sustainable Endowments Institute



Mark Orłowski is Founder and Executive Director of the Sustainable Endowments Institute, a Cambridge-based nonprofit organization founded in 2005 as a special project of Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors. SEI pioneers research, education and collaboration to advance resilient institutional responses to the climate crisis.

Mark is a sustainability innovator helping to transform the way that higher education, healthcare and other nonprofit institutions confront climate change. Recognizing that these institutions serve as role models and talent incubators, train future leaders, conduct influential research and serve the community, Mark seeks to inspire savvy sustainability strategies to leverage a multiplier effect. To further this vision, he launched the Institute's annual College Sustainability Report Card (published 2007 – 2011) and he currently leads the Billion Dollar Green Challenge (20011 – present). The Challenge facilitates institutional establishment of green revolving funds to transform energy efficiency improvements from perceived expenses to high-return investment opportunities.

Since the Institute's founding, Mark has spoken at more than 120 colleges in over 30 states. He has also presented at numerous conferences, at the United Nations symposium on Sustainable Energy for All and as the featured commencement speaker at Berkshire Community College. Along with widespread coverage by campus newspapers, numerous reports on his work have appeared in the national and business press. Media coverage includes articles in Boston Globe, CNN Money, Forbes, The New York Times, USA Today, profiles in BusinessWeek and the Chronicle of Philanthropy as well as interviews on NPR and PBS.

A graduate of Williams College, Mr. Orłowski served on the college's Advisory Committee on Shareholder Responsibility and chaired its Campus Environmental Advisory Committee. He also received an associate's degree from Berkshire Community College and earned a master's degree at Harvard University, where he studied nonprofit management.

BRIEN LEWIS, Catawba College



Brien Lewis is the 23rd President of Catawba College. Brien is a native of Toronto, Canada. He holds a bachelor's degree in political science from UNC-Chapel Hill, which he attended as a Morehead Scholar, and a law degree from the University of Toronto.

He practiced law for several years before moving into academic and administrative roles at Winthrop University and then coming to Catawba in April of 2012.

JOHN P. HEGMAN, Agnes Scott College



John P. Hegman is vice president for business and finance at Agnes Scott College. Prior to assuming this position at Agnes Scott in 2005, he spent nearly 10 years as the vice president of finance and administration at Converse College. Previously, he held senior financial administration positions in the private industry.

Mr. Hegman received his B.S. in accounting and his M.B.A. from the University of Dayton. He is a Certified Management Accountant by the Institute of Management Accounting. Mr. Hegman is a member of the National Association of College and University Business Officers and the Institute of Management Accounting.

His civic affiliations include Rotary, Cultural Facilities Group, South Carolina and Georgia Independent Colleges and Universities - Business Officers, City Council, Chamber of Commerce, City Community Service Organization, Planning Board, and Jaycees.

Mr. Hegman is the liaison administrator for the Audit, Buildings and Grounds, Finance and Investment committees of the Board of Trustees. As a senior administrator for Agnes Scott College, Mr. Hegman is responsible for endowment administration, business and finance functions, human resources, facilities, public safety and out-sourced operations. The college is currently renovating a 55,000 square foot residential/academic building, which falls under his supervision. The endowment currently is valued at \$250 million and supports approximately 40% of the college operating budget. The 100 acre campus includes 28 buildings and a 118 unit apartment complex and rental homes totaling more than 1,260,000 gross square feet of building space. Agnes Scott College was founded in 1889 and is an independent undergraduate liberal arts college for women. The college is located in Decatur, Georgia with an undergraduate enrollment of approximately 1000 students.

HEATHER HENRIKSEN, Harvard University



Heather Henriksen is the Director of the Harvard Office for Sustainability. In this role she oversees a team of change agents that works across more than 12 Schools and administrative departments to set and achieve Harvard's university-wide sustainability goals. She manages working groups and committees that leverage the unique knowledge of students, faculty and staff to develop innovative and replicable models for cost-effective and lasting environmental change. Heather also coordinates external sustainability partnerships with higher education peers, businesses and government agencies. She co-chairs a sustainability working group of the International Sustainable Campus Network (ISCN) and the Sustainability Working Group for the Council of Ivy Presidents. In partnership with Harvard's Executive Vice President she coordinates the Higher Education Working Group of the City of Boston's Green Ribbon Commission and serves on the Cambridge Compact for a Sustainable Future Steering Committee with the City of Cambridge, MIT and several private and not-for-profit sector leaders.

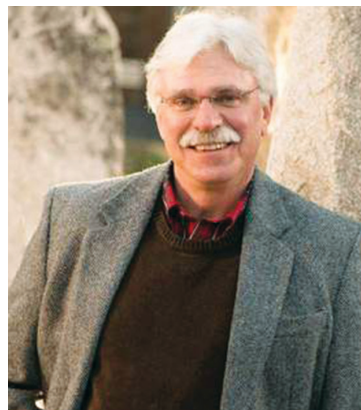
Outside of Harvard, Heather is a partner of Environmental Entrepreneurs (E2), a national community of business people lobbying for environmental policies that protect the environment while building economic prosperity. She serves on the Board of Trustees of Phillips Brooks House Association, the undergraduate social service and social action organization at Harvard College, and previously served on Secretary Napolitano's Sustainability and Efficiency Task Force, Department of Homeland Security.

Prior to joining Harvard, Heather was Director of Corporate Marketing & Business Development at Time Warner and served as an Assistant Director at Stanford University Law School. She holds a Master's in Public Administration with a focus on energy and environment from the Harvard Kennedy School (HKS). While a student at HKS, Heather was a member of the Harvard University Task Force on Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions, commissioned by President Drew Faust to recommend a greenhouse gas reduction goal.

Organizational Leadership for Sustainability Education

PRESENTER:

STEPHEN MULKEY, Unity College



Stephen Mulkey assumed the post of president at Unity College on July 1, 2011. As president, Dr. Mulkey is a champion of sustainability science, which he sees as the defining framework for academic programming at Unity College.

In just under two years, he has set an agenda for the College that is bold and visionary. It is driven by ethical imperatives that he feels are non-negotiable. In November 2012, the Unity College Board of Trustees voted unanimously to divest from investment in fossil fuels. As the first college in the nation to do so, Unity provided a measure of leadership that is unrivaled.

Prior to setting Unity's agenda for initiating the spark to encourage higher education to take a stand on the mitigation of global climate change through the first step of divesting from investment in fossil fuels, Mulkey organized the College's academics with a forward thinking approach. He pivoted the curriculum to focus on the "what's next" of environmentalism, sustainability science, and the transdisciplinary (collaborative) approach to ecological problem solving.

Since his arrival accolades have followed, including multiple "green" architecture awards for the design (student/faculty and staff collaboration with award-winning green architecture firm GO Logic of Belfast, Maine) and building of TerraHaus, the first college residence hall in the United States built to the Passive House standard, today's highest energy rating.

As a scholar of the interdisciplinary literature in climate change and sustainability, Mulkey is an active public interpreter of climate change science. As an expert climate change scientist with study spanning over three decades he has pursued research on the functional ecology of forests in Eastern Amazonia, tropical forest canopies in wet and dry forests of Central Panama, and tropical alpine rosette species in East Africa. Mulkey's book, *Tropical Forest Plant Ecophysiology*, takes readers out of the laboratory and into the humid tropical forests exploring the most recent advances and important insights into the behavior of tropical plants.

Mulkey is a tireless champion of Unity College's science-based liberal arts curriculum, holding it aloft as a source of inspiration for students who strive to be leaders in sustainability science, imagining and enacting solutions to 21st century environmental issues. As a result Unity's graduates will contribute to the renewal of civilization.

From 2008 through 2011, Mulkey was a faculty member at the University of Idaho and served as director of the program in environmental science. In this role, he led a grant proposal initiative obtaining National Science Foundation funding for the creation of a new professional science master's degree in Natural Resources and Environmental Sciences. In addition and with major funding from NASA, he directed a statewide project focused on climate change education.

From 1996 to 2008, he served as a tenured faculty member in the University of Florida's Department of Botany and as a research associate with the School of Forest Resources and Conservation. He also served as director of research and outreach/extension for the School of Natural Resources and Environment at the University of Florida, and as a science advisor to the Century Commission for a Sustainable Florida.

Mulkey co-founded and directed the International Center for Tropical Ecology, a nationally ranked graduate training and conservation program during his tenure at the University of Missouri in St. Louis. He also worked for many years as a research associate for the Smithsonian Institution, Tropical Research Institute. Mulkey holds a bachelor's degree in fisheries and wildlife, a master's degree in ecology, and earned his doctorate's degree in ecology from the University of Pennsylvania in 1986.

AARON S. ALLEN, University of North Carolina at Greensboro



Aaron S. Allen is Associate Professor of Musicology at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, where he also serves on the faculty committee for the Environmental Studies Program and as the University's Academic Sustainability Coordinator. After earning a BA in music and a BS in environmental studies from Tulane University, he received the Ph.D. from Harvard with a dissertation on the nineteenth-century Italian reception of Beethoven.

He co-founded and chaired the Ecocriticism Study Group of the American Musicological Society and the Ecomusicology Special Interest Group of the Society for Ethnomusicology, and he currently edits their joint *Ecomusicology Newsletter*. He has published and presented on campus environmental issues, Beethoven, and ecomusicology, and he is currently co-editing a volume of ecomusicology essays and co-authoring *The Tree that became a Lute: Musical Instruments, Sustainability and the Politics of Natural Resource Use*.

Allen spent 2011-12 as a fellow in modern Italian studies at the American Academy in Rome.

JEFF TODD TITON, Brown University



Jeff Todd Titon is professor emeritus of music at Brown University, where for 27 years he directed the PhD program in ethnomusicology. In his book *Worlds of Music* (1984) he wrote about musical cultures as ecosystems, and in recent years he has lectured and published on music, sound, and sustainability.

His appeal for an acoustic commons for all living creatures appeared last winter in *Smithsonian Folkways Magazine*; his May, 2013 keynote address in João Pessoa for the Association of Brazilian Ethnomusicologists (ABET) was on "The Nature of Ecomusicology," and his August, 2013 keynote address for the Symposium on Cultural Sustainability was "Some Reflections on "Economic Man," Conservation Biology and the Commonwealth of Culture."

As co-editor of the new Indiana University Press series *Music, Nature, Place* Von Glahn seeks to create a forum for multidisciplinary scholarship that traverses boundaries between classical, popular, and folk musics, rural and urban issues and conditions, and science and the humanities.

FELICIA DAVIS, UNCF Institute for Capacity Building Facilities and Infrastructure Enhancement Program



Felicia M. Davis, directs the Building Green Initiative housed at Clark Atlanta University within the Atlanta University Center-the largest consortium of historically black colleges and universities in the nation. Created by UNCF, the program advances green building and other sustainability efforts at historically black, Hispanic-serving and tribal colleges and universities. Davis is committed to helping Black colleges and other special mission institutions make the transition to a more environmentally and economically sustainable future. Davis has been advocate for just climate policy since attending the UN Climate Conference in The Hague in 2000.

Among her many accomplishments, she is an experienced NGO participant in United Nations conferences on women, technology, and climate change; she serves as the North America Focal Point for Gender CC-Women for Climate Justice-an international advocacy coalition; she produced the MSI Green Report. She also produced Sustainable Campuses-Building Green at Minority Serving Institutions. An author of the critical Air of Injustice Report, she brought together the Georgia Coalition for the Peoples' Agenda, Black

Leadership Forum, Clean Air Task Force and the Clear the Air Campaign in a historic collaboration. A senior fellow with the Institute for Georgia Environmental Leadership and the Environmental Leadership Program, Davis serves on the Board of the Georgia Coalition of Black Women and the National Coalition's Black Women's Roundtable; a contributor to DogonVillage.com, an African American focused website online since 1995; and she is a founding partner in Women Flying High, LLC.

DR. CARLTON BROWN, President, Clark Atlanta



Carlton E. Brown, Ed.D., became the third president of Clark Atlanta University on August 1, 2008, after serving as Executive Vice President and Provost of the University for one year.

Prior to joining Clark Atlanta University as Executive Vice President and Provost, Dr. Brown was appointed by Georgia Board of Regents Chancellor Errol Davis to assist in the implementation of major system-wide initiatives. Dr. Brown has garnered a great wealth of executive experience and accomplishments in higher education, having served as the president of Savannah State University for nine and a half years and having held senior-level administrative positions at several universities, including Hampton University and Old Dominion University. He joined Hampton in 1990 as the Dean of the School of Liberal Arts and Education and in 1996 was promoted to Vice President for Planning and Dean of the Graduate College. Prior to his roles at Hampton, Dr. Brown served as an executive with the School of Education at Old Dominion University.

In addition to his many achievements in academia, Dr. Brown also has amassed considerable expertise in business and industry through accomplishments stemming from positions, consultancies, research, authorships, and service roles at the state and national levels.

An outspoken critic of the lack of government response to Katrina, Illai also works with Black Youth Vote to promote youth civic engagement.



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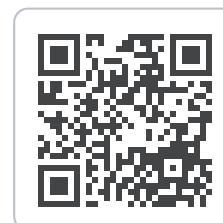
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MARKESE BRYANT STUDENT SUMMIT KEYNOTE

After graduation, Markese joined Green For All to build and manage the College Ambassador Program, which focused on fostering young, green-economy champions at 15 HBCUs. Through this program, Markese played an integral role in organizing the largest delegation of African American college students to attend any Power Shift conference to date.

Markese Bryant is a graduate of Morehouse College with a Bachelor of Arts in African American Studies.

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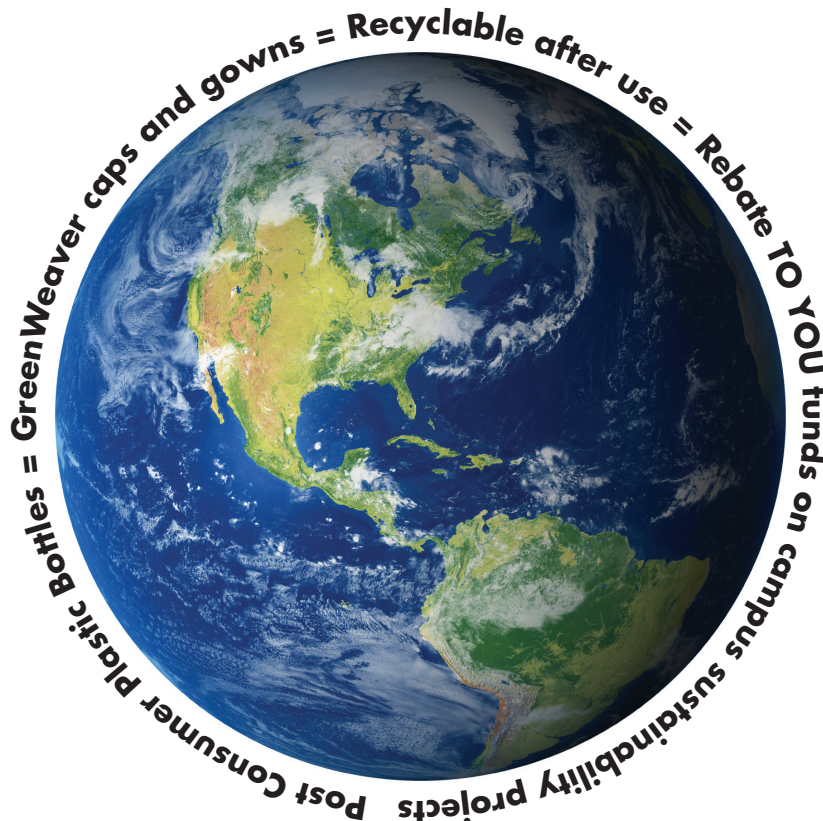


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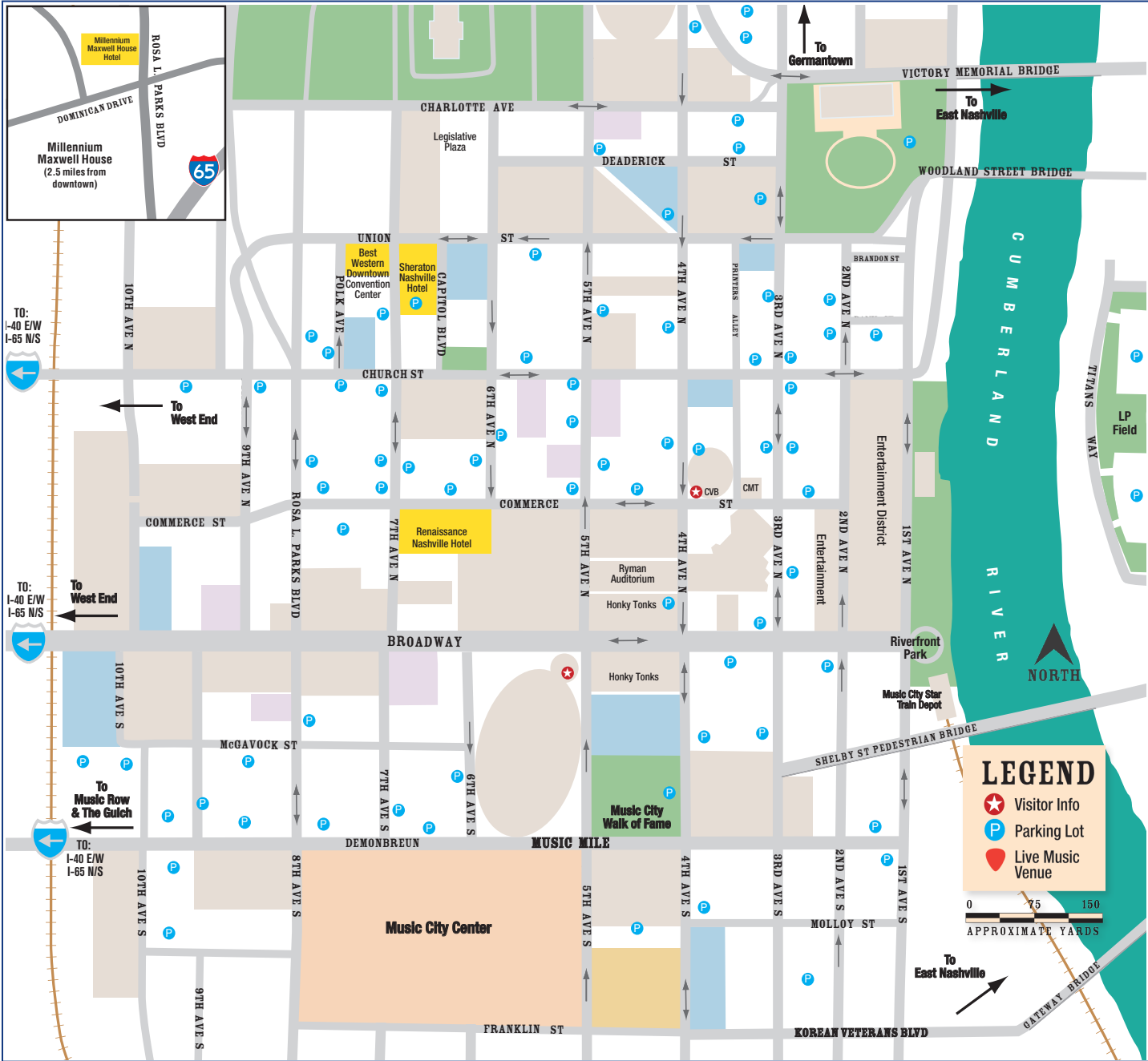
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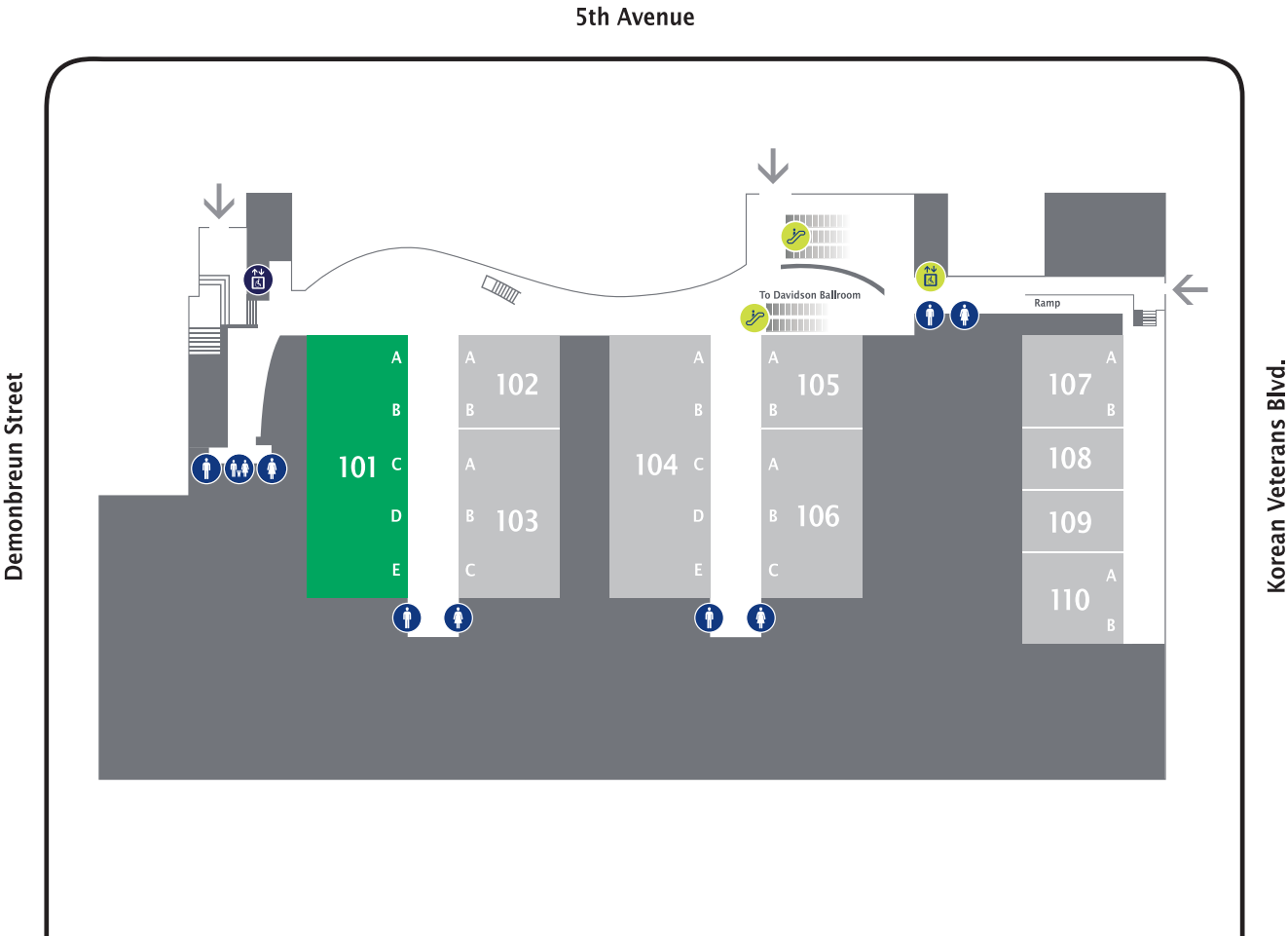

MUSIC CITY CENTER MAP

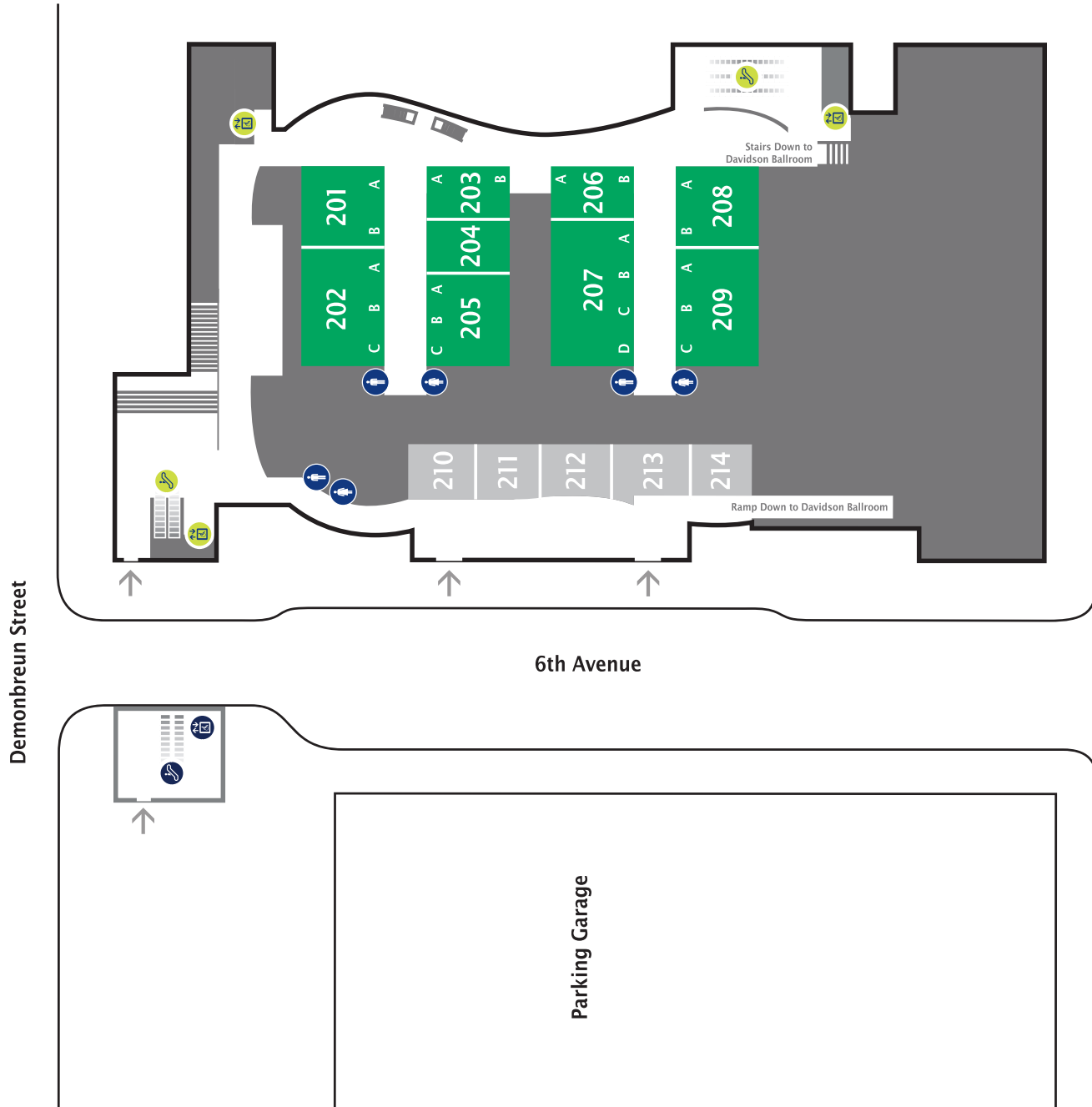

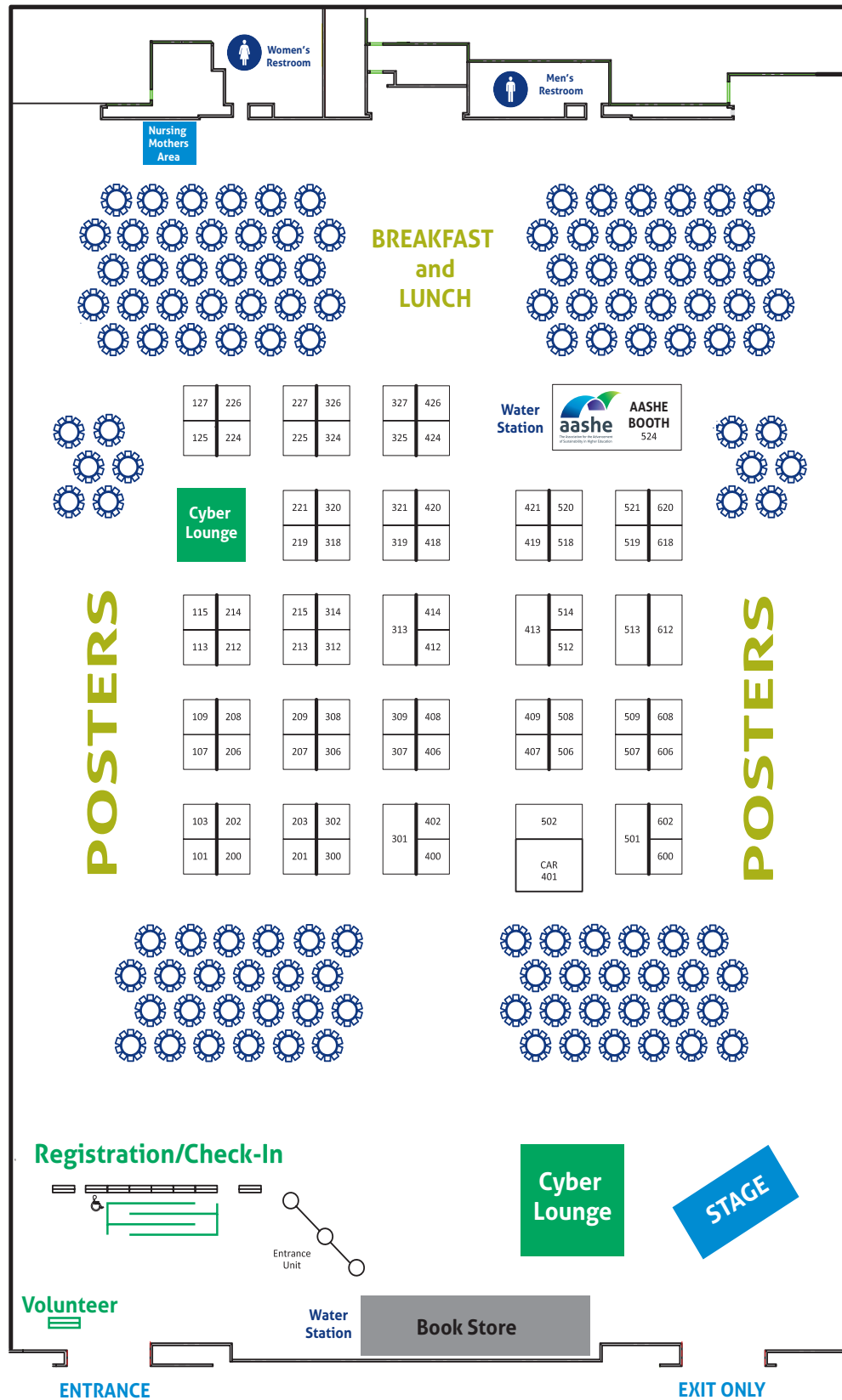
